

TOTAL AND PER CAPITA PERSONAL INCOME CHANGES ALL STATES

Personal income includes money received on a regular basis plus government and business transfer payments (e.g. Medicare benefits) and government interest. Data in this report provides personal income changes between 2009 and 2010.

METHODOLOGY

This income measure is estimated by the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis from a variety of administrative records including Internal Revenue Service data and sample surveys.

REVISIONS:

These data are subject to regular revisions for several years after their release. In order to account for changes in the input data series, the complete series is revised every five to seven years.

RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER DATA:

The definition of personal income, reported by BEA, differs from the definition of money income reported by the Census Bureau in that money income includes only money received by individuals on a regular basis. Additionally, money income data are based on self reporting on a sample survey and personal income data are based on administrative records.
